



## **Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) Spending 2018/2019**

The pupil premium is extra funding which schools are given to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils.

### **Principles**

At Rodmarton Primary School we ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all of the pupils. We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed.

All our work through the pupil premium will be aimed at moving children to, at least, age related expectations. Initially, this will be in English and maths. Ultimately, the use of the pupil premium funding will secure effective engagement from pupils to their school programme and, therefore, this may cover basic physical needs, educational and emotional support and extra-curricular activities.

In 2017/ 18, the total amount of funding received was £5074 (including £2434 brought forward from the previous year.

The way that we spent the funding was to:

- Provide additional interventions with Teaching Assistants – both supporting groups in Literacy and Numeracy and on a one-to-one basis £4716
- To support pupil emotional wellbeing and raise their self-esteem through a weekly nurture group £248
- Provide after school clubs £150
- Provide free school milk £8
- Contribute to the cost of school trips £200

### **Barriers to Educational Achievement**

- Inequality of opportunity within the pupil population.
- Low aspiration and expectations.
- Narrow experience of life outside school.
