# GCC COVID-19 RISK ASSESSMENT PROCESS FOR FULL REOPENING SCHOOLS



#### **COVID-19 Risk Assessment for Full Reopening of Schools**

#### **ASSESS**

Decide appropriate control measures for managers and employees to implement under a 'Plan', 'Do', 'Review' cycle.

\*The preventative measures in this risk assessment are not mandatory but are provided as guidance on reducing the risk of transmission and comply with DfE 'system of control' requirements. Each school/setting must consider their own situation and adapt the assessment by editing the measures where appropriate. Remove any measures that are not relevant or will not be applied in your setting and add any additional local measures that you are implementing. This format does not have to be used but your local risk assessment must be suitable and sufficient.

Who may be at risk: Employees, pupils and young people, families (parents, carers and siblings), visitors, contractors, members of public.

Vulnerable groups: Where schools apply the full measures in this guidance the risks to all staff will be mitigated significantly, including those who are extremely clinically vulnerable and clinically vulnerable. Some people with particular characteristics may be at comparatively increased risk from COVID-19 (due to age, deprivation, ethnicity, etc.). An individual risk assessment may be appropriate for those who are very anxious about returning to their workplace.

- should be identified in addition to the usual medical room.
- Ensure school has sufficient supplies of PPE including cleaning materials and hand washing/sanitising liquids that meet DfE/PHE requirements.
- Provide suitable and sufficient bins to support pupils and staff to follow the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach.
- Provide sufficient tissues in all rooms.
- Distancing and other measures in place throughout the building.
- Separate facilities be provided for meals and refreshments in different zones (e.g. pods, kiosks, cafes).
- Evaluate the capacity of rooms and shared areas.
- Plan for staggered lunches with more sittings to avoid mixing, allowing time for cleaning, devise seating plans, safe capacity etc.
- Door signs identify max number in room / toilets at one time.
- COVID-19 posters/ signage displayed.
- Identify 'crunch points' (e.g. entrances/ exits/ corridors/ shared space

- Employees fully briefed about the plans and protective measures identified in the risk assessment.
- Regular staff briefings.
- Keeping in touch with off-site workers on their working arrangements including their welfare, mental and physical health and personal security.
- Regular communications that those who have coronavirus symptoms, or who have someone in their household who does, are not to attend school.
- Information shared about testing available for those with symptoms.
- Where there are appropriate sources of guidance (e.g. CLEAPSS, afPE, CILIP, etc.) Heads of Departments/ teachers should

- Shared pens sanitized.
- Hand sanitiser provided in offices, resources room and classrooms.
- Pupils, staff and visitors to remove face coverings at school and wash hands immediately on arrival.
- Covered bins provided on entrances to dispose of temporary face coverings.
- Gathering at the school gates prohibited.
- Staff on duty outside school to monitor protection measures.

#### **Visitors**

- Wherever possible keep meetings on a virtual platform (e.g. 1:1 sessions with professionals, recruitment interviews, parental meetings etc.).
- Parents/carers and visitors coming onto the site without an

- Bubble 3- Oak class
- Keep a record of pupils and staff in each bubble, lesson or close contact group.
- School breakfast and after-school clubs to keep to a minimum with bubbles kept distanced where possible.

#### Minimise mixing

- Bubbles kept apart from other groups where possible.
- Groups use the same classroom or area of a setting throughout the day.
- Mixing between bubbles kept to a minimum during arrival, lunchtime, breaks and departure.
- Pupil movements around the school site, either in groups or individuals is controlled to limit contact and mixing.
- The number of pupils in shared spaces (e.g. halls,

- with information on what to do next.
- An unwell child awaiting collection will be isolated in a suitable room with or without adult supervision (depending on age and needs of the child).
- Staff caring for a child awaiting collection to keep a distance of 2 metres.
- PPE to be worn by staff caring for the child, including:
  - a face mask worn if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained.
  - if contact is necessary, then gloves, an apron and a face mask should be worn
  - eye protection where there is a risk of fluids entering the eye, for example, from coughing, spitting or vomiting.
- Staff to wash their hands after caring

- The effectiveness of prevention measures will be monitored by school leaders.

- and consider how movement can be staggered.
- In areas where queues may form, put down floor markings to indicate distancing.
- Identify doors that can be propped open (to limit use of door handles and aid ventilation) taking account of fire safety and safeguarding. Seek advice from SHE if necessary.
- Identify rooms that can be accessed directly from outside (to avoid shared use of corridors).
- Organise classrooms for maintaining space between seats and desks.
- Arrange desks seating pupils side by side and facing forwards (apart from EYFS).
- Inspect classrooms and remove unnecessary items and furniture to make more space.
- Arrangements in place an enhanced cleaning schedule that includes frequent cleaning of rooms, shared areas that are used by different groups and frequently touched surfaces.

- Identify and plan lessons that could take place outdoors.

- Plan for remote education for pupils, alongside classroom teaching in case of a lockdown or pupils having to isolate.

#### Parents/pupils

- Review EHCPs where required.
- Educate pupils before they return about the need to stay apart from others and expectations around hygiene.
- Communicate to parents on the

- Site guidance on physical distancing and hygiene is explained to visitors on or before arrival.
- Where possible visits arranged outside of school hours.
- A record kept of all visitors to assist NHS Test and Trace, including:
  - o the name;
  - a contact phone number;
  - date of visit;
  - arrival and departure time;
  - the name of the assigned staff member.

## Open Days/ Parents Evenings

GCC recommends:

- Open days, parents evenings and other events will be avoided.
- e Events will be held on a virtual platform to avoid gatherings in school.

Where such events do take place:

- dining areas and internal and external sports facilities) for lunch and exercise is limited to specific bubbles.
- Large gatherings such as assemblies or collective worship with more than one group to be avoided.
- Separate spaces for each group clearly indicated.
- Multiple groups do not use outdoor equipment simultaneously.
- Limiting the number of pupils who use the toilet facilities at one time.
- Allow pupils to have access to toilets at all times during the day to prevent queues developing at social times.
- The same teacher(s) and other staff are assigned to each bubble and, as far as possible, these stay the same.

- for a child with symptoms.
- All areas where a person with symptoms has been to be cleaned after they have left.
- Should staff have close hands-on contact they should monitor themselves for symptoms of possible COVID-19 over the following 14 days.

#### Hand washing

- Frequent hand washing encouraged for adults and pupils (following guidance on hand cleaning).
- Sufficient handwashing facilities are available.
- Where there is no sink, hand sanitiser provided in classrooms.
- Skin friendly skin cleaning wipes used as an alternative to hand washing or sanitiser.
- Pupils to clean their hands when they arrive at

- Staggered starts or adjusting start and finish times to keep groups apart as they arrive and leave school.
- Stagger break times and lunch times to avoid mixing and time for cleaning surfaces in the dining hall between groups.
- When timetabling, groups should be kept apart and movement around the school site kept to a minimum to avoid creating busy corridors, entrances and exits.
- Prepare arrangements to allow remote learning to take place should a partial or full closure of the school be required, at any point in the next academic year.

#### Policies and procedures

- Update policies to reflect changes brought about by COVID-19, including:
  - Safeguarding/child protection
  - Behaviour
  - o Curriculum
  - o NQTs
  - Special educational needs
  - Visitors to school
- Ensure website is compliant with regards to the publishing of policies.

- preventative measures being taken.
- Post the risk assessment or details of measures on school website.
- Parents and pupils informed about the process that has been agreed for drop off and collection.
- Ensure parents have a point of contact for reassurance as to the plans put in place.
- equipment pupils bring into school each day to essentials such as lunch boxes, hats, coats, books, stationery and mobile phones.
- Bags are allowed.
- All pupils told to not share resources in class but keep their own equipment in their tray.
- Parents informed, whenever possible, only one parent to

- Large parents' events will not take place.
- Whenever parents/ visitors are on site:
- Measures taken to ensure the strict adherence to social distancing of 2 metres.

The size and

- circumstance of the rooms/spaces will determine the maximum number of people that can be accommodated while also facilitating social distancing. In determining the number of people that can reasonably follow 2 metres distancing the total floorspace as well as likely pinch points and busy areas taken into account (e.g. entrances, exits).
- Attendees will be pre-bookings only to manage numbers and will help with the Test and Trace (see below).
- Weather permitting, stalls

- Staff that move between classes and year groups, to keep their distance from pupils and other staff.
- Avoid mixing during breakfast and after-school clubs, where possible. If not possible, space children at a distance.

#### **Distancing**

- Staff to keep 2 metres from other adults as much as possible.
- Where possible staff to maintain distance from their pupils, staying at the front of the class.
- Staff to avoid close face to face contact and minimise time spent within 1 metre of anyone.
- Supply teachers, peripatetic teachers and/or other temporary staff to minimise contact and maintain as much distance as

- school, when they return from breaks, when they change rooms and before and after eating.
- Staff help is available for pupils who have trouble cleaning their hands independently (e.g. small children and pupils with complex needs).
- Use resources such as "e-bug" to teach effective hand hygiene etc.

#### Respiratory hygiene

- Adults and pupils are encouraged not to touch their mouth, eyes and nose.
- Adults and pupils encouraged to use a tissue to cough or sneeze and use bins for tissue waste ('catch it, bin it, kill it')
- Tissues to be provided.
- Bins for tissues provided and are emptied throughout the day.

#### Ventilation

- Establish a visitors' protocol so that parents, contactors, professionals working with individual children are clear about the infection control measures that you have in place.
- Governing boards and school leaders to have regard to staff (including the headteacher) work-life balance and wellbeing. Information shared about the extra mental health support for pupils and teachers is available.

#### Response to any infection

- Leadership understands the NHS Test and Trace process and how to contact their local Public Health England health protection team.
- Plan how to inform staff members and parents/ carers that they will need to be ready and willing to
  - book a test if they are displaying symptoms;
  - inform the school immediately of the results of a test;
  - provide details of anyone they have been in close contact with:
  - self-isolate if necessary.

- accompany child to school.
- Clear messages to pupils about minimising the use of public transport and how to reduce the risks of transmission outside of school.
- Staggered drop-off and collection times planned and communicated to parents.
- Made clear to parents that they cannot gather at entrance gates or doors.
- Encourage parents to phone school and make telephone appointments if they wish to discuss their child (to avoid face to face meetings).
- Communications to parents (and young people) includes advice on transport.

#### Others

 Communication with contractors and suppliers that will need to prepare to support

- set up outside as the risk of transmission is lower outdoors.
- Making use of multiple exit and entry points.
- Introduce a oneway flow in and out, with appropriate floor markings or signage.
- Any changes to entrances, exits and queues take into account the need to make reasonable adjustments for those who need them, such as people with disabilities.
- Arrival and departure times of different group will be effectively supervised so as to reduce the pressure at exits and entrances.
- Queues managed to reduce the risk of congestion
- Socially distanced queuing systems.
- Frequently touched surfaces cleaned regularly.

- possible from other staff.
- The occupancy of staff rooms and offices limited.
- Use of staff rooms to be minimised.
- Staff in shared spaces (e.g. office) to avoid working facing each other.
- Reducing use of lifts to only those that need to use them.
- Use a simple 'no touching' approach for young children to understand the need to maintain distance.
- Older children to be encouraged to keep their distance within bubbles.

#### **Minimising contact**

- Doors propped open, where safe to do so to limit use of door handles. Ensure closed when premises unoccupied.
- Taking books and other shared resources home limited, although unnecessary sharing avoided.

- Increase the supply of fresh air by opening windows and doors (where safe to do so).
- Use ceiling fans or desk fans for good air circulation.
- Ventilations system that removes and recirculates air to different rooms is turned off.
- Ventilation system remains on at all times, even when the building is unoccupied. The system set to operate at lower ventilation rates during evenings and weekends.

#### Music

- Singing, wind and brass playing should not take place in larger groups such as school choirs and ensembles, or school assemblies.
- Measures to be taken when playing instruments or singing in small groups such as in

#### **Swimming**

- If using external swimming provision, liaise with the provider and discuss any changes, to check the risks have been assessed and they have implemented COVID-secure control measures following guidance.
- The same bubbles from the classroom will be applied to the pool groups.
- When delivering swimming lessons teachers and assistant deliver from the poolside.
- The numbers of personnel on poolside sufficient to ensure safety and teaching whilst maintaining social distancing.
- Where practical, each swimming teacher to deliver from alternate sides of the pool.
- A consistent way of moving around poolside established to reduce staff cross-overs and promote social distancing practice (e.g. one way).
- Hand cleaning stations and additional waste bins on poolside and in changing rooms.
- Sufficient time between lessons for cleaning and to reduce the chance of

- plans for full opening (e.g. cleaning, catering, food supplies, hygiene suppliers).
- Assurances that caterers comply with the guidance for food businesses on COVID-19.
- Discussion with caterers to agree arrangements for staggered lunches (e.g. seating capacity, holding hot food, cleaning between sittings, distancing and minimising contacts).
- Liaison with transport providers to cater for any changes to start and finish times and confirm protective measures during journeys.
- Communication with other building users (e.g. lettings, extended school provision, regular visitors, etc.)
- Limit visitors by exception (e.g. for priority contractors, emergencies etc.).

- On entering and leaving everyone, to wash their hands.
- Wash stations will be provided.
- Wearing face coverings if maintaining 2m distancing is difficult.
- Toilets kept open and carefully managed e.g. avoid overcrowding, ensure distancing, regular cleaning.
- To support the NHS Test and Trace a temporary record of attendees to be kept for 21 days, in a way that is manageable. This will include name and contact number.
- Car parking to be managed to help people socially distance.
- Evacuation procedures reviewed, particularly if normal fire exits are changed or inaccessible.

- Staff and pupils to have their own individual and very frequently used equipment, such as pencils and pens.
- Borrowed reading books quarantined for at least 2 days.

#### PE and School Sport

- Pupils kept in same consistent bubbles where possible during PE and sport.
- Sports equipment thoroughly cleaned between each use.
- Staff fully aware of COVID-19 guidance for restarting competitive sport issued by the relevant governing bodies and the required actions for each sport.
- Outdoor sports should be prioritised where possible.
- Large indoor spaces used where it is not.
- Distance between pupils from mixed bubbles will be maximised.

music lessons include:

- physical distancing;
- playing outside wherever possible;
- limiting group sizes to no more than 15:
- positioning pupils back-toback or sideto-side:
- avoiding sharing of instruments;
- ensuring good ventilation.

#### Cleaning

- Sanitising spray and paper towels to be provided in classrooms for use by members of staff.
- Thorough cleaning of rooms at the end of the day.
- Shared materials and surfaces to be cleaned frequently (e.g. toys, books, desks, chairs, doors, sinks, toilets, light switches, handrails, etc.).
- Resources that are shared between

- bubbles overlapping at the poolside and in changing rooms.
- All equipment should be sanitised before and after each activity. Where possible submerge equipment in adequately disinfected swimming pool water.
- Pupils do not share equipment.

#### Lettings and nonschool users

- Hiring out school premises and facilities permitted if those responsible for them are ready to do so and they can do so safely, following COVID-19 Secure guidelines.
- A risk assessment should determine the maximum capacity of a hall or hire space while able to maintain social distancing according to the current relevant guidelines.
- Any groups hiring the facilities must refer to relevant government guidance or their own associations and national governing body for guidance on running the club or event following the COVID-19 guidelines.
- The school can ask any hiring organisation to provide evidence

 Sporting activities delivered by external coaches, clubs and organisations will only go ahead if they can satisfy the above requirements.

### Educational Visits and journeys

- From the autumn term, nonovernight educational visits only.
- Risk assessments of visits and journeys to be undertaken by visit leaders.
- No overnight and overseas visits until government guidance changes.
- Pupils grouped together on transport in the same bubbles that are adopted within school where possible.
- Journey's planned to allow distancing within vehicles (this may mean large vehicles or more are used).
- The use of face coverings for

- bubbles (e.g. sports, art and science equipment) to be cleaned frequently and meticulously and always between bubbles.
- Outdoor equipment appropriately cleaned frequently.
- Toilets to be cleaned regularly.
- Hand sanitiser provided for the operation of lifts.
- Staff providing close hands-on contact with pupils need to increase their level of self-protection, such as minimising close contact and having more frequent hand-washing and other hygiene measures, and regular cleaning of surfaces.

#### **PPE**

The majority of staff in education settings will not require PPE beyond what they would normally need for their work. PPE is only needed in a very small number of cases, including:
